Update on Swaziland to eSwatini Name Change

As reported last May in **FIRST ISSUES** V27N2, Swaziland officially changed its name to the Kingdom of eSwatini on April 19, 2018. Also in this V27N2 article, I stated a web site showed a set of 4 stamps issued on August 31, 2018 with the new name – but that I had not located anyone selling them.

The 2020 Scott Catalogues do not list any new issues for Swaziland beyond 2017. Further, the Swazi Post web site is badly out of date and shows no stamps after 2013. Hence, I could not confirm if these stamps were the first issued with the new name.

All this changed a few months ago when I found an eBay seller (from eSwatini) selling the stamps. I decided to purchase them without Scott's verification.

I purchased a MNH block of four of each of these stamps (shown at right, 125%). I am placing one set in my album (as a name change / change in government issue) and am placing the other three sets in Auction 103 (pages 7-8 of this Newsletter). I have no idea what Scott will list as an SCV for these stamps, but I put a minimum bid of \$6.50 on each set of 4 as that is what I paid for them (including p&h from eSwatini to me). Even though the auction only lists a single lot (lot 43), I will sell a set to each of the top three bidders – and donate anything above my costs to the FICC treasury.

I also bought a philatelic "Official First Day Cover" with a cachet bearing all four stamps. The cancellation states the issue date as 30.4.18. This CDS date of April 30 is much more in line with



formal name-change date of April 19, 2018. Given this, I feel strongly that these were the first issued stamps after the name change occurred.

Let me re-state, I have no idea what Scott (or any other catalogue) will assign as a value for these stamps. It may be more or less than the \$6.50 auction price. ... Further, it may or may not be difficult to find these stamps on the open market regardless of the CV. Personally, I believe they will be scarce.

Guide to Ebay® Searches for #1s

The COVID-19 "Shelter in Place" order has left me with additional free time. As I have been searching eBay, I have discovered the save search function. It allows me to take a quick look at items while I am on-line and notifies me when items are added that meet my search.

Once you search an item you can click the heart next to the 'Save this search' to add it to your list. Once on your list you can select 'subscribe', this will send you an email when items are added meeting your search criteria. A recent saved search I added was 'Number 1s of the world'. It will only



work it the seller uses this in the description, but I have had some luck with it. You can use a topic like number 1s of the world or more specific for any item you have been desperately seeking – 'Indonesia 2L1'.

A 17-Year Mystery Finally Solved

Approximately 17 years ago, I attended an auction associated with the APS StampShow and purchased a collection of the "small ship" stamps (Sc#1-5) from Guayana. These stamps are listed in Scott at the end of Venezuela. This sent me down a path (or a rabbit hole, depending on your viewpoint). I developed a minor obsession with these stamps and decided to study them in detail. This obsession expanded to the similar "small ship" stamps from Maturin and Mariño also printed as part of the 1903 revolutions of these other areas.

As part of the original purchase, I encountered one stamp (a Sc#3) that was from the original printing (most Guayana stamps are reprints). Shown at right (150%), this stamp not only had the blue control mark that was applied to most stamps, but was also signed by Antonio Sucre (fiscal officer). Although he was supposed to sign all stamps (guaranteeing they were genuine), my observations (as well as Gebauer, ref 3) are that this signature was not applied to stamps on cover, but only applied to remainder stamps signed before being



sold after the revolution was quashed. As seen on the Sc#3 shown above, it had another blue marking in the lower left corner that looked very much like the top of a "5" from an overprint or a cancel.




I researched diligently trying to identify this additional marking – without any luck whatsoever. I even contacted Don Avery, author of a 2009 article published in THE AMERICAN PHILATELIST on these stamps. No new learning


My luck finally changed recently when I saw two stamps from Guayana (a Sc#11 and a Sc#15) on eBay® with the same signature by Sucre and a full overprint design that had my "5" at the top. That said, it clearly was not a "5". I purchased the Sc#11 so that I would have the full overprint in my collection for future reference. I did not know what the overprint was for, or what it represented, but I now knew what I was searching for.

I pulled out my reference articles on these stamps that I obtained from the APRL (American Philatelic Research Library) and re-read them with this new information in mind.

It didn't take long before I found an extremely similar figure in Georges Brunel's 1934 book on the postal stamps of Venezuela (Ref 1). In the section of the book discussing the large stamp issues (Sc#11-15), Mr. Brunel states (translated from the book's French), "These stamps are found with the signature of



This same design is also found in Gebauer's 1981 article in The Collectors Club Philatelist (ref 3). [Note, the picture from the articles is inverted relative to the design found on both stamps.] It is now clear to me that this hand stamp of Sucre's initials is the long missing explanation of the marking on my Sc#3 purchased 17 years ago.



My excuse(s) for missing this... One, neither the top nor the bottom of the design found in the articles looks like the "top of a 5" which I had imprinted into my brain. Two, both the Brunel book and the Gebauer article suggested this design was only applied to the large stamps (Sc#11-15) and not the small ship stamps (Sc#1-5).

In any event, I am now ecstatic that my 17-year old mystery has been solved.

Lighting the Collecting Fire

My collecting interests have bounced around over the years. Starting with US and general worldwide (as a Cub Scout), then narrowing to US and starting a US possessions collection as a teen. I dropped worldwide due to my desire to have some end game. I needed a collection that could at least be formulated into a have and want list. After divesting the worldwide collection, I missed learning about the stamp issuing countries, particularly the dead countries and occupation issues. That led me to an ad in APS for #1's of the world. An opportunity to collect each country was a way to appease that interest in history and geography.

While first issue collecting has been in the mix for 30 years, it was never a priority. This was partly due to not finding a great way to display the collection. I was using stock pages with a small handwritten notes with the name of the country and date of issue. I enjoyed the idea of the first issues, but the display was my stumbling block. About two years ago, I had the idea I could make my own pages, just as I do for my Hawaii covers. Why it took years to figure this out is beyond me.

I decided to use one page for each stamp issuing entity. Using Microsoft Word, I created a template for the pages. I used a border on the page and the header function to format the name of the issuing entity, date of issue and catalog number. I used the Scott Catalog, the First Issues website, Wikipedia, and other specialty websites as the source for the information. As additional content, I focused on how the country was established, looking at history of colonies, occupations, war, and other key historical events.





My next issue was mounting the stamps. Measuring stamps and making boxes was a very time-consuming process. The pages still did not look balanced as finding the correct centering was difficult. I moved to simply placing a line across the page based on the number of the stamps being placed on the page. I changed the font color for the line to the lightest gray available, so the line did not distract from the presentation. I used a ruler to balance the stamps across the line. Quick and simple to complete the layout and the horizontal line kept the stamps in line.

While I collect the first set, this still left many pages basically empty. Option one was to add additional text, but I did not want to turn the album into a book. My next idea was to add a cover to fill the spot. This worked out nicely, my cover collection is minimal at this point, but I have some options for the future.

The flexibility of making my own album pages is endless. My first issue collection includes N's and L's. There are several N's I consider collectable beyond the first listed issue. Estonia is one example, with German occupation in WW 1 (Scott 1 & 2) and German occupation in WW 2 (Scott 3-5).

For placing them in the album, I contemplated alphabetical and chronological by date of first issue. The chronological list from the First Issues website could have been used to add pages in order by issue date. With my addition of N's and L's, I thought the alphabetical listing based on the Scott Catalogue would be the most logical way to display the general issues alongside the N's and L's.





Building the album pages has re-lit the fire for first issue collecting. While Hawaii remains my passion, the option to pick up near minimum value first issues sets gives me a nice area to actively add to my collection, trade with members of the local stamp club and enjoy the opportunity to sort through club purchases. After two years, I'm about 2/3 of the way through building the album. Part of the slow pace has been the ability to add to the collection faster than I can make pages. A good problem to have.

I would be happy to email a few page templates to anyone interested. From the template you can make pages for your collection by replacing the text. I just change the name to the file and save each page as a new file. I would also appreciate other members sharing their display practices. It does not require a lengthy article, a few scans of pages would be great.

WEB SITE TRAFFIC

Visitor numbers and page views have both dropped significantly in recent months and the averages now stand at 9 visitors and 38 page views each day. In January we passed the milestone of 10,000 visitors since the current count began in July 2016 (as explained previously, repeat visits from the same device in the same week are not counted).

The list of countries logging in has extended to 124, now more than half of the total of 241. New visitors have come from Albania, Jordan, Moldova and Trinidad & Tobago.
